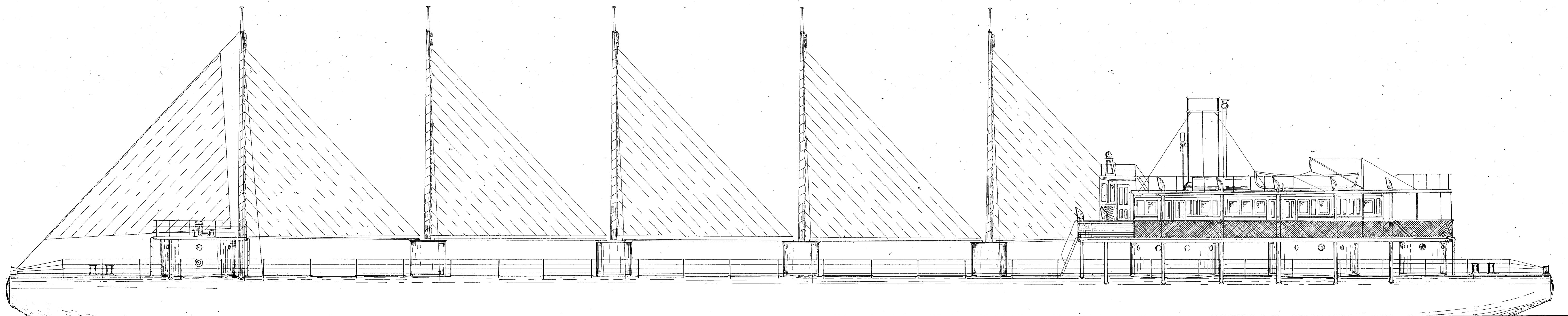
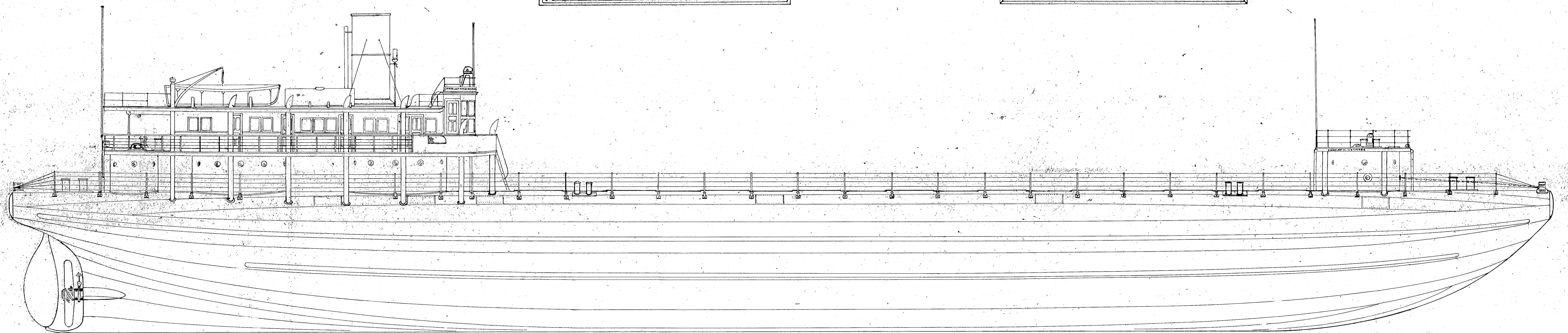


HISTORY

Three (3) sister ships were built - CHARLES W. WETMORE (112), E. S. HARTLETT (113), & the A. D. THOMSON (114). The WETMORE left Duluth loaded with wheat, on June 10, 1891, passed through the Soo & Welland Canals and down the St. Lawrence River, arriving at Liverpool, England in early July. She returned to the U.S. At Wilmington, Del. she loaded machinery and steel, and sailed around the Horn to Everett, Wash. On Sept. 8, 1892, she went aground on the bar at Coos Bay, Wash. and was abandoned. All the crew were saved.
